Abstract

This book investigates contemporary human security issues in East Africa, setting forth policy recommendations and a research agenda for future studies. Human security takes a people-centered rather than state-centered approach to security issues, focusing on whether people feel safe, free from fear, want and indignity. This book investigates human security in East Africa, encompassing issues as diverse as migration, housing, climate change, displacement, food security, aflatoxins, land rights, and peace and conflict resolution. In particular, the book showcases innovative original research from African scholars based on the continent and abroad, and together the contributors provide policy recommendations and set forth a human security research agenda for East Africa, which encompasses Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Somalia, Rwanda, Burundi, South Sudan, Sudan, Ethiopia, Eritrea, and Djibouti. As well as being useful for policy makers and practitioners, this book will interest researchers across African Studies, Security Studies, Environmental Studies, Political Science, Global Governance, International Relations, and Human Geography.

Abstract

This chapter introduces the reader to security theory and practice, including the concept of human security as conceptualized and operationalized in the book. The chapter begins by situating the book within a broader global context characterized by major global trends most notably: interconnectedness, interdependence, decline in multilateralism, proliferation of non-state actors, technological advance, and a security landscape in flux as exemplified in part by the current reality of COVID-19 pandemic. The chapter then discusses the lay of the land with regard to security theory and practice before tracing the history, origin, and evolution of the human security concept. Finally, it provides a working definition of the concept for the book and presents the book's human security conceptual framework. The chapter's main argument is that human security provides a better framework for understanding, preventing, and responding to 21st-century security challenges, including climate change, pandemics, disasters, and terrorism among others.

Abstract

This chapter introduces the reader to the book and its main arguments. The chapter begins by situating the book within the broader policy and scholarly debates about sustainable development and sustainable development goals. The chapter then proceeds on to draw a link between sustainable development agenda, on the one hand, and human security agenda, on the other hand. After establishing the linkage, the chapter situates the book within its geographical context of focus by providing pertinent background information on the East Africa region, which is defined broadly to include eleven countries namely Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Burundi, Rwanda, Sudan, South Sudan, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Djibouti, and Somalia. Finally, the chapter describes the organization of the book and provides a concise summary of chapters of the book.

Abstract

This chapter explores the implications of aflatoxins for human security in East Africa. The chapter establishes that the aflatoxins problem is pervasive in East Africa and present a unique challenge to human security in the region. Dietary exposure to aflatoxins results in negative health outcomes such as aflatoxin poisoning, increased incidence of liver cancers in adults, immune suppression, vaccine effectiveness interference, and possible growth impairments in children. The chapter establishes that because of scanty data on occurrences, the true magnitude of aflatoxin poisoning in the region is not known and at best grossly underestimated. The chapter identifies limited diagnostic capabilities especially in rural hospitals, as one of the reasons for the noted underestimation of aflatoxin poisoning in the region. The chapter also establishes that aflatoxins present significant barriers to trade and contribute to economic vulnerabilities and food insecurity. The chapter recommends (1) the creation of more testing facilities in rural areas, (2) increased investments in agriculture and food production, and (3) further research to understand the interplay between aflatoxins and COVID-19, and implications of the same for human security in the region considering the noted compounding effects of long-term exposure to aflatoxins, in particular immune suppression, and interference with vaccine effectiveness.
